FROM THE RABBI by Rabbi Steven Conn

Believe it or not, one of the first arguments Illyse and I ever had was over matzah pizza.

During our first Passover together, I invited Ilyse and her nephew and niece to join us for lunch. The kids wanted matzah pizza. So did my kids. So I went into the kitchen to mix up my



matzah pizza dough the way I had always done: combining matzah farfel with eggs, salt and pepper.

I had barely gotten started when Illyse came into the kitchen.

"What are you doing?" she asked.

"Making the dough for the matzah pizza."

"How long will it take, the kids are really hungry?"

"It will take about 15 minutes for me to get the crust baked and then another 15 or 20 minutes to bake after I put on the topping."

"That's too long. The kids are really hungry. They really like the kind of matzah pizza where you just spread sauce and cheese on the matzah and just bake it for a few minutes."

"But this is so much better. I've never just slapped sauce and cheese on a piece of matzah."

"But that's what they want. So stop messing around and just make them a simple matzah pizza."

I am embarrassed to say that the argument just escalated from there. In my mind, I was firmly convinced that my way to make matzah pizza was the only way and that once the kids had tasted it, they would never want to go back. To me, somehow, this was a matter of principle and I was not backing down. I was so adamant about sticking to my guns that I managed to ruin five people's afternoons along the way.

For a long time, I have been reluctant to tell this story. Who gets into a fight over the right way to make matzah pizza? Who puts commitment to the purity of the culinary arts above feeding a group of hungry children? Not one of my finest moments.

Lately, though, I have begun to see my behavior with a little more understanding. Yes, I was wrong, stubborn and willfully oblivious. But I was also being very human. Each one of us has our routines. Each one of us has made a thousand decisions about the right way to do things, whether it is the way we get ready in the morning or the kinds of vacations we take or the way we wash our clothes. Once we make these decisions, we stick to them so that our lives can feel orderly and efficient, so that we do not have to make so many decisions every day. Without our

routines, we would be so busy making decisions about mundane things that we would never get anything done.

Sometimes, though, we can get so stuck in our routines that we cannot respond to changes in our circumstances. For many years, for example, my routine was to eat two sandwiches for lunch. But sometime in early middle age, I could feel my metabolism slowing down. I was starting to gain weight. I stuck with my lunch routine anyway, it was what I had always done. It was not until my clothes no longer fit me that I was finally able to accept my new reality and make a permanent change.

On that fateful Passover afternoon, I was also stuck in my routine. My circumstances had changed, but I had not fully embraced the change. I was engaged to a woman who had her own routines, and brought into our relationship a niece and nephew who had their own routines as well. I wanted these wonderful people to be a part of my life, but I guess I wanted them to be a part of my life on my own terms. Relationships do not work that way. In any new relationship, we must be prepared to be flexible, to respond to others' needs and be open to others' ways of thinking and doing things. Routines have to be open to negotiation and even reexamination in the light of new circumstances. If we insist on staying stuck in our routines, conflict is inevitable and our relationships will not thrive.

The matzah pizza incident was just one step in a long process for me of learning to be more flexible, more adaptable and less stuck in my routines. It took me a long time to understand that to be a good husband, father and rabbi, I had to embrace flexibility. So many things have changed in my family life, in my professional life and in the world that we live in during the last twenty years. Managing all these changes became much easier the more I learned to be comfortable with adapting my routines and my assumptions to the what was happening around me.

From my perspective, learning to be more flexible is one the most important things we can do if we want to live a happier and more fulfilled life. Almost two thousand years ago, Rabbi Shimon ben Elazar taught

At all times, let a person be as supple as a reed and not rigid as a cedar.

A reed, when the winds come and blow upon it, bends with them; when the winds are still the reed is yet upright in its place. And the end of this reed? Its good fortune is to be used as the pen that writes the Torah scroll.

The cedar, however, does not remain standing in its place; for as soon as the south wind blows, it uproots it and tears it down. And the end of the

cedar? Loggers come upon it and chop it up and use it to cover the house-tops. And what remains, they cast to the flames.

As we approach the new year, let's make sure we are not stuck in unhelpful routines. Let's ask ourselves, what has changed in our lives? Where are we experiencing conflict or discomfort? How can we change our assumptions and routines to work better for our new reality? How can we push ourselves to be more flexible and more open to new ways of doing things?

These are important questions for each of us to ask ourselves as individuals as we prepare for the High Holidays. These are also important questions to ask ourselves as a congregation. So many things have changed for our Plainview Old Bethpage Jewish community in the last five years, the last ten years, the last twenty years. What do we need to do to adapt to our new circumstances. What do we need to do that we are a happy and thriving congregation? Together, we must work on answering these pressing questions. All we know now is that the answer to our questions begins, as does the answer to so many questions in our lives, with our willingness to be as flexible as a reed.

FRONT DOOR SECURITY

As a part of maintaining a secure building at all times. especially when security personnel are not present (evening meetings and evening services), the front doors will no longer be open just prior to the start of a meeting or services. We will institute the policy below:

Commencing immediately, in order to gain access to the synagogue using the front entrance doors (again when there is no security personnel on site), everyone will be required to ring the video intercom button to the left of the doors. The doors will be unlocked by the remote control and you will be able to gain access to the building. For those requiring handicap access, an automatic door opener has been installed and the button is clearly marked. The right hand door will open by an automatic arm and close behind you.

Gift Cards can still be purchased by credit card. However those credit card purchases will not be applied to reduce your financial obligations.

If you have already fulfilled your financial obligations for the current year, you can still take advantage of this new Voluntary Financial Obligation Offset Gift Card Purchase Program by purchasing the gift cards and having the applicable amount reduce your future obligations. Respecting others' privacy is an important Jewish value. *Lashon HaRa*—gossip—is uniformly condemned by our tradition. But there is at least one exception. When someone is ill or in need of care and support, it is a mitzvah to tell people who can help.

In our community, the Rabbi provide pastoral support to individuals and families who are suffering illness and those who need emotional support. The Rabbi also serves as the liaison to our newly formed Bikur Cholim Committee; which provides additional visits and support to those who request it.

Please let the Rabbi know when someone in our congregation is ill; or when a family is dealing with a crisis. Only when they know can they reach out to individuals and families in need. Only when they know can they mobilize our Bikur Cholim committee to provide additional support. Don't worry that they might already have the information. Don't worry that you are "bothering" these busy people. The information you provide will be vital to helping our congregation to serve the needs of those who need us the most.
