FRONT DOOR SECURITY

To my fellow congregants:

As a part of maintaining a secure building at all times. especially when security personnel are not present (evening meetings and evening services), the front doors will no longer be open just prior to the start of a meeting or services. We will institute the policy below:

Commencing immediately, in order to gain access to the synagogue using the front entrance doors (again when there is no security personnel on site), everyone will be required to ring the video intercom button to the left of the doors. The doors will be unlocked by the remote control and you will be able to gain access to the building. For those requiring handicap access, an automatic door opener has been installed and the button is clearly marked. The right hand door will open by an automatic arm and close behind you.

FROM THE RABBI by Rabbi Steven Conn

Dear Friends.

I shared the following thoughts with the congregation on Shabbat morning March 9th. I realize that by the time you read this column, events may have rendered my message out of date. In this case, I will take that chance. In my mind, it's a win-win proposition. Either my message will be as timely as ever or the Gaza War will be over and Israel will finally be at peace and the hostages will be free. Frankly, I would much prefer the latter outcome.



We Jews are not the only ones who use the new moon to determine when the month begins. The Moslems also base their calendar on the new moon. Each month, when we celebrate Rosh Chodesh, our Moslem neighbors also mark the beginning of a new month. A few minutes ago, we announced that the new month of Adar Sheni will begin tonight, tomorrow and Monday. The new month of Ramadan will begin for Moslems tomorrow night.

Ramadan, of course, is the holiest month on the Islamic calendar; a month of fasting, feasting, prayer and charity. Up until a few days ago, there was hope that Ramadan would also bring at least some of the Israeli hostages home. Negotiations were serious and ongoing. President Biden had publicly expressed his optimism that an agreement could be reached. But as of last night, the negotiations had stalled out again, just as they had several times before. After Israel had agreed to a plan brokered by Egypt, Qatar and the United States for a six week pause and the release of all female hostages as well as a large number of Palestinian prisoners, Hamas imposed new conditions. These conditions included a permanent ceasefire, a complete withdrawal of Israel troops from Gaza and the release of hundreds of Hamas terrorists who had killed or wounded Israelis. Of course, Hamas would also remain in control of Gaza.

Understandably, Israel could not agree to these new demands. Leaving Hamas in control of Gaza would allow Hamas to rebuild its terrorist infrastructure and regroup and reinforce its fighters with released prisoners and new recruits. Israel would soon find itself facing the threat of renewed rocket attacks or another October 7th style invasion. Cease fire talks have stalled out, as they have so many times before. All the optimism of the last few weeks is gone. Even President Biden is now admitting that the possibility of a cease fire agreement before Ramadan is "remote".

Israel went into the Gaza War with two goals: the free the hostages and to drive Hamas from power. At this point, neither goal seems achievable. The IDF has acquitted itself well in Gaza, for the most part. Israel has operational control of most of the area. Thousand of Hamas fighters have been killed or captured, countless tunnels, rocket launchers and weapons manufacturing sites have been destroyed. Isra-

el's causalities, though painful, have been less than might have been expected. But the IDF has only been able to rescue three of the hostages. Three other hostages were killed accidentally by Israel soldiers. At this point, there is little chance of a dramatic hostage rescue operation. The only clear path to freeing the hostages is through negotiations and negotiations have broken down, again. The hostages remain Hamas's main source of leverage, its best chance of ensuring it will stay in power. Hamas will not let the hostages go without extracting major concessions from Israel, including a guarantee of its survival.

Removing Hamas from power by using military force seems even less likely. The remaining Hamas forces are mostly concentrated in the city of Rafah. So are 1.5 million Palestinian refugees. Israel has hesitated to extend the war to Rafah for weeks. The Israeli military knows that a large scale assault on Rafah could unleash a diplomatic and humanitarian crisis far worse than anything we have seen so far. Israeli government officials have floated vague plans to evacuate women and children from Rafah, but it far from clear if they are workable—or that the United States would allow it. Meanwhile Egypt has sent its army to make sure no Palestinian refugees cross into the Sinai. Even if Israel overcame these obstacles, Hamas leaders might still be able to evade capture. Meanwhile, anger toward Israel serves as a highly effective tool for Hamas to use in recruiting new fighters. It is entirely possible that, for all of Israel's military prowess, unseating Hamas may be beyond its capabilities.

Right now, Israel finds itself facing what looks like a lose-lose proposition. Israel cannot free the remaining hostages without capitulating to Hamas and endangering millions of Israelis. Israel cannot attempt to win the war through military force without setting off a major humanitarian crisis and rallying more Palestinians to Hamas's side. Neither of Israel's goals looks achievable. What seems more likely is a long, bloody war of attrition that leaves the hostages in Gaza, thousands of Israelis displaced from their homes and an ongoing humaintarian crisis in Gaza.

There has to be another way. In this morning's special maftir reading for Parshat Shekalim, God instructs Moses: When you take a census of the Israelite men according to their army enrollment, each shall pay Adonai a ransom for himself on being enrolled. . . This is what everyone who is entered in the records shall pay: a half-shekel by the sanctuary weight.

Generations of commentators have asked the question "why does the Torah mandate half a shekel contribution for each person? Why not a whole coin instead?"

Like many other commentators, Rabbi Moshe Alshcih believed the half shekel was meant to serve as a reminder to the Israelites, "to show them that are indeed, connected to to each other, so that it would not occur to anyone to that he is separate or distinct from his fellow man. Because everyone is just a half, and when they join

with another, they become a whole." Another commentator connects the half shekel with the famous teaching of Hillel "If I am not for myself, who will be for me. But if I am only for myself, what am I?" There are things we have to do on our own, times when we have to rely on only ourselves. But that is only half the story. We also have to be willing to turn to others, to join with them, to help them and be helped by them if we want to achieve our shared goals and live in harmony in a healthy society.

Israel's leaders have often felt that they had to go it alone; that they could not rely on the understanding or support of other nations to ensure Israel's security. They have often been right. After the October 7th terror attacks, there was a moment when it seemed like Israel might not have to go it alone this time. But within weeks, ten countries had already cut or downgraded their ties to Israel. South Africa brought Israel before the World Court of Justice on charges of genocide not long after. A torrent of hate was unleashed in the streets of many of the world's major cities. The UN put up resolution after resolution condemning Israel, with only the United States preventing their adoption.

Israel has had to assert its right to self-defense in the face of a hostile world. Israel has had to press the world to recognize the sexual and physical violence unleashed against Israeli women by Hamas terrorists. Israel has had to be for itself, because it could not count on anyone else being for it. But there is a limit to what even Israel can do by itself. And I am afraid we have reached that limit. Israel has to begin to work with other nations to bring about a fair and long lasting solution to the crisis in Gaza. The United States, Germany, France, Great Britain the Gulf States, Egypt and Saudi Arabia very much want to join with Israel to change the status quo in Gaza. They are asking from Israel one thing in return—one thing to create the best chance for a lasting peace, one thing in order to formalize a strong alliance between Israel and its Sunni Moslem neighbors. Commit to a process of ramping up humanitarian aid, returning the governance of Gaza to a responsible body of Palestinians and taking real steps toward the creation of a Palestinian State. Israel has resisted taking these steps for many years, claiming it had no partners for peace, worried that a Palestinian State would devolve into a terrorist threat on Israel's doorstep. The lack of a Palestinian state has not prevented thousands of terror attacks and missile barrages. The partners for peace are now knocking at Israel's doors, seeking to create an alliance to counter the malevolence of Iran. It is time for Israel to at least explore the path not taken. It is time for Israel to try something besides going it alone. It does not seem likely that Israel will secure the release of the hostages on its own. It does not seem likely Israel can win a decisive victory in Gaza alone. But maybe, just maybe, Israel can join with other nations who also want peace to break this cycle of endless war and finally achieve some real security.

The year seems to be flying by as we are already looking towards celebrating Pesach. While this holiday requires a lot of planning, work and preparation, I think it is one of my favorites. The foods are different (some of which we only eat once a year),



the story of the Jews' exodus from Egypt never gets old (although it is thousands of years old), and I love cooking and preparing with my family. Everyone has their own secret to making fluffy and flavorful matzo balls and we all have our preference for what we like to eat on matzo (I love butter and salt). The smell of a holiday meal cooking and the beauty of the holiday table set with the seder plate, candle sticks, kiddush cup, Miriam's cup, matzo cover and afikomen bag helps to contribute to the wonderful feeling of belonging I associate with Pesach.

In the space given to me, I have chosen to share a simple recipe that Molly and I cook together and that she has already mastered. I love knowing that our tradition of cooking together will be passed on in this recipe. Another fun tradition that our family does is to sing song parodies with the Pesach theme during dessert. I will now share with you a favorite recipe and song parody with love and peace in my mind.

Matzo Toffee (sometimes referred to as "Matzo Crack")

1/2 lb matzo

1c butter or margarine

1c packed brown sugar

12 oz. semi-sweet chocolate chips

1c toppings (ie. shredded coconut, chopped nuts, sprinkles, mini marshmallows)

Preheat oven to 450 degrees. In a 15x10 cookie sheet (w/ sides) put 1 layer of matzo on the bottom of the pan. Heat butter & brown sugar in pot on stove top until it melts. Continue heating (stirring continuously) until it coats the spoon evenly. Pour mixture over matzo, spread evenly and bake for 4 minutes. Remove from oven, spread chocolate chips evenly over mixture and bake for 1 minute. Remove from oven, spread (shmear) chocolate evenly with a baking spatula, sprinkle with topping of choice. Refrigerate until chocolate is hard. Break into pieces and serve.



Tuesday, April 9 @ 8pm Mark Schleisner, Facilitator of Holocaust restitution to speak at PJC

Mark Schleisner is the son of German Holocaust refugees. His father, Joseph, escaped Germany in 1941, and his mother, Lori, spent WWII as a hidden child in Belgium. They both lost multiple family members in the German death camps.

In 2000, Mark obtained restitution for Lori from the French government for having deported her father to Auschwitz in 1943. Since then, Mark helped over a dozen other people obtain similar restitution from both the French government and France's national railroad (which transported Jews to the camps).

In his presentation, Mark will describe his family's Holocaust history, his experience growing up in as a child of Holocaust survivors, and how he found his path as a facilitator of Holocaust restitution.

Respecting others' privacy is an important Jewish value. *Lashon HaRa*—gossip—is uniformly condemned by our tradition. But there is at least one exception. When someone is ill or in need of care and support, it is a mitzvah to tell people who can help.

In our community, the Rabbi provide pastoral support to individuals and families who are suffering illness and those who need emotional support. The Rabbi also serves as the liaison to our newly formed Bikur Cholim Committee; which provides additional visits and support to those who request it.

Please let the Rabbi know when someone in our congregation is ill; or when a family is dealing with a crisis. Only when they know can they reach out to individuals and families in need. Only when they know can they mobilize our Bikur Cholim committee to provide additional support. Don't worry that they might already have the information. Don't worry that you are "bothering" these busy people. The information you provide will be vital to helping our congregation to serve the needs of those who need us the most.
