

#### FROM THE RABBI by Rabbi Steven Conn

Rosh HaShannah is less than a month away. Normally, the High Holidays are the highlight of the Jewish year for most of us, and certainly for our synagogue. The holidays are the one time a year when we are all together as a congregation. We see people we may not have seen all year. We marvel at how each other's families have grown. We sing familiar songs and are moved by the ancient sound of the



shofar. We celebrate our connection to each other, to our synagogue and to Jewish tradition. Even people who do not find much in the traditional liturgy to inspire them often say that they take great comfort in the familiar experience of attending services every year.

As we move into the final phase of planning this year's High Holiday services, however, the experience will be anything but familiar. The continued threat from the COVID-19 virus has made celebrating the High Holidays in the usual way impossible. We are being forced to abandon so much of what makes the High Holidays special in our synagogue. We will not be gathering together with the entire congregation for services in our building. Some people, probably the majority, will attend via livestream from their homes instead. We will see far fewer familiar faces, and the faces we do see will be hidden behind masks. We will have shorter services—for the first time ever someone may actually complain that services were not long enough. We will not go up to the ark for honors. We will not sound the shofar 100 times on Rosh HaShannah. And there will be no congregating in the lobby or out on the patio during services. Those of us who do come to services will enter the building, sit in our seats, and leave soon after services are over.

As I have been working on refining our plans for the holidays, I have asked myself more than once, "How can we do this? Will it even feel like holidays? How much can we change, how much can we do without, before we lose the essence of the holidays themselves?" I think that many of us are asking questions like this about our holiday celebrations. Without our families and friends, with such a limited experience of services, will it feel like the holidays at all if almost everything is different than what we are used to.

Judaism is a religion based on traditions and continuity. We value keeping things the same, whether it is making sure our Torah scroll looks just like the scrolls that Jews used two thousand years ago or reciting the same set of prayers every day that Jews have recited since the middle ages. This emphasis on continuity was part of the plan from the very beginning. During his farewell addresses in the Book of Deutoronmy, which we are reading this month, Moses clearly sets forth the prinicple that the Torah should not change.

"Be careful to observe only that which I enjoin upon you: neither add to it nor take away from it." (Deut. 13:1)

"You shall act in accordance with the instructions (Torah) given you and the ruling handed down to you; you must not deviate from the verdict that they announce to you either to the right or to the left." (Deut. 17:10)

The literally meaning of the these verses would seem to be that we should never change anything commanded to us by the Torah. Once we establish a practice, whether it is sounding the shofar or fixing an order of prayers for Rosh HaShannah, it can never be altered. We cannot make our practice more lenient or more stringent. We have to continue to do things the way we have always done them, turning neither left nor right.

As obvious as this understanding would seem to be, Maimonides, among others, interprets these verses differently.. In his code of law Mishneh Torah, Maimonides observes, "We make a blessing thanking God for commanding us to light Hanukkah candles or read the Megilah on Purim?" Yet neither of these practices are commanded in the Torah. They were added by the sages later on. This shows us that rabbis and judges in every age are given the responsibility of interpreting the Torah and establishing the practices appropriate for their times. These new practices are just as sacred as the words of the written Torah, because the Torah established a process through which rabbis and judges would continue to add new practices when the circumstances of the Jewish people changed." In short, Maimonides believed that our verses gave rabbis and judges license to change Jewish practices if and when the need arose in the interest of keeping Judaism relevant to the people of that time. The Torah is not just the words got gave us at Mount Sinai.. The rulings handed down by the authorities of each generation become a part of the Torah as well.

It is still true that the first rule of Judaism is "Don't Change Stuff." Our traditions are our lifeblood. But, as we learn from Maimonides, the second rule of Judaism is "change stuff." Not arbitrarily of course. There is always a need for knowledge, care and a reverence for what has always been. But sometimes, things need to change. Sometimes there is a momentous event that we need to remember, like the miracles of Hanukkah or Purim. And when there is, we add observances to enrich Judaism. Sometimes, there is a catastrophe that threatens our very existence, like the destruction of the Second Temple. In that case, we may need to subtract some traditions, like animal sacrifices, because they are no longer feasible.

Rather than giving up worship altogether, we shift our emphasis to prayer, something I am sure Moses never imagined.

This year, in these extraordinary times, we are going to need to change things. We will do so carefully, with reverence for our tradition. But we will change. We will change things so that we can experience the High Holidays as much as possible given our circumstances. We will change things so that we can experience the power of being a part of a community, even if that experience is delivered in a form that is different from what we are used to. We will change things so that we can make sure that no one in our community has to celebrate the holidays alone, even if they are in isolation.

In order to accomplish these goals, though, we have to make an even bigger change. We have to let go of the expectations we have built up over the years. For some of us, this letting go will be very painful. We love our holiday traditions and will experience a deep sense of loss when we are unable to observe them. We may need to give ourselves some time to mourn our loss and to acknowledge that it is okay to be sad that things will be different. But we cannot let ourselves dwell too long in our grief. For if we do, we will miss the opportunity to find fulfillment in High Holiday traditions, old and new, that we have available to us.

Ultimately, we have to embrace the idea that there are other ways to have an inspiring and memorable experience of the High Holidays. We have to open ourselves up to new traditions and new ways of carrying out old traditions. We have to allow ourselves to find community and connection in whatever form is available, not just in a packed sanctuary or a crowded dining table, but also socially distanced, outdoors and virtually. We need to go forward into this holiday season with a determination to make our experience meaningful and memorable. I can promise that Plainview Jewish Center will provide a wide variety of resources to support us as we navigate this challenge. If, together with our PJC Family, we can succeed in embracing the opportunities this unprecedented High Holiday season offers, we may be able to make these High Holidays into an opportunity for a unique and fulfilling experience that we will never forget.

We have agreed to have live services and we will also transmit through Zoom/Social Media, as we know that some won't feel comfortable coming to a crowded Shul. I must stress that we will have all the necessary signs and items in place to make sure we have enough to keep the safety and required distance while in the sanctuary and the rest of our buildings.

We will reschedule the congregants' 30 years plus membership celebration. This is something we were all looking forward to. Our Hebrew school will be having in person and virtual ability of instruction for those who feel safer at home.

On another note, our Shul lost revenue from the annual Journal Dinner Dance that is our main annual fundraiser. We also rely on our upcoming Kol Nidre pledges and thankfully, while our finances are under control, the upcoming sale of the cantor's house will be a positive. More than ever, we need your thoughts and assistance on how to raise funds for our Shul. You must know that dues alone will not carry us through as the demographics have dramatically changed. Where are the conservative Jews? Invite a friend or two to share our information and take them on a virtual tour through our website. 

#### **High Holiday Information**

#### How will services be different this year?

Morning Services for Rosh HaShannah and Yom Kippur will be abbreviated so that the total time will be 2-2 1/2 hours per service.

Honors will only be given out for Torah aliyahs. These aliyahs will be taken from the honorees seats.

The sanctuary and ballroom will be thoroughly cleaned after each service. MERV-13 filters have been installed in our HVAC system. The system has received a thorough maintenance check.

Rabbi Conn will deliver only brief sermons at in-person services. Full sermons will be livestreamed.

#### What about virtual services?

All services will be livestreamed.

Livestream broadcasts of the Rosh HaShannah morning services, Kol Nidre Service and Yom Kippur Morning service will be made available **only to members who have pre-approved registration.** 

Member families will be able to "sign out" High Holidays Mahzors (prayerbooks) to use with our livestream services.

There will be outdoor community shofar soundings on the Second Day of Rosh HaShannah at selected locations in Plainview Old-Bethpage.

We wish you a safe and healthy New Year!

#### **Department of Homeland Security Grant Update**

As most of you are aware, Plainview Jewish Center was awarded a \$100,000 DHS grant for 2019 and another \$100,000 DHS grant for 2020. We want to thank Rabbi Conn for all of his invaluable assistance in the writing of these grants. While we have three years to use the monies from each grant, we formed a committee to use the monies effectively and implement security measures much sooner than that through a structured evaluation of vendors and solutions. I am the chairperson of this committee, and the members of our team are Rabbi Conn, Bruce Hymowitz, Alan Miller, Gene Brickman, Marc Richter, and Norman Kaufman. We meet regularly in an effort to implement the grants in accordance with DHS processes. The funds from the grants are going to be used to update the physical security of PJC. In addition, through the help of the JCRC, we will be developing policies and procedures, and implementing training for the staff, congregants and children of the temple. We will keep you updated on our progress.

#### Religious School - Mrs. Shira Ornstein, Education Director Open Minds Open Doors

It's September, and the new school year has begun. Wow, are things different this year. We are all trying to find ways to take control of our lives, for the benefit of our families and ourselves, and yet things seem so out of control. We are all proactively looking to create new normals, rather than feeling like external forces are thrust upon us outside of our control. Take for example traditional classroom learning, that changed drastically during the past school year. Religious school education, as the education system overall, faced a multitude of challenges and had to adapt quickly to new protocols, procedures and ways of teaching.

Over the summer my staff and I have continued our mission to gain control as much as we possibly can right now. We are proactively creating new ways of teaching that will be used whether we teach in person, remotely, or with a hybrid model. We've taken time over the summer to research online programs and to be trained in their usage. Highlights of these new programs include using movement to enhance learning about Holidays, using technology to implement a values based curriculum that will also supplement learning about Holidays, adding a digital component to learning prayers, and adding online games to promote learning the Hebrew alphabet and vocabulary.

Surely, we will face challenges this school year and we are committed to doing our best. We have and will continue to look beyond immediate changes and ground our teaching in three areas in which we can gain control. The three areas are teaching excellence, commitment to our students, and love of Jewish customs, values and practice. Our staff is comprised of seasoned teachers with proven track records who at the same time are adult learners. This year we will have several team teachers, and we are confident that this will allow teachers to teach what they are best at. While certain things are beyond our control now, we are focusing on what we can master to reclaim control.

On a personnel (and personal) level, our religious school is here for our parents, students and families. Our priority goal is always to meet the needs of our students and providing the best Jewish education possible is inherent in our mission. And we also turn to our parents, our dedicated partners, to excite the children about our curriculum, learning and special programs. Together, we will grow and support one another to ensure that your children receive the best education possible.

Gift Cards can still be purchased by credit card. However those credit card purchases will not be applied to reduce your financial obligations.

If you have already fulfilled your financial obligations for the current year, you can still take advantage of this new Voluntary Financial Obligation Offset Gift Card Purchase Program by purchasing the gift cards and having the applicable amount reduce your future obligations.

Additionally, I am delighted to announce that there has been no limit placed on this program. Buy as many or as few Gift Cards as you like. For every dollar purchased through this program, two percent will be applied to your financial obligations.







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
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


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
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#### PSSST! IT'S OKAY TO TALK ABOUT OTHER PEOPLE
