FROM THE RABBI by Rabbi Steven Conn

Many of us have been eagerly looking forward to the beginning of a new year. 2020 has been a horrendous year for almost everyone. The COVID-19 outbreak radically altered almost every aspect of our lives for the worse. We could not celebrate holidays with our extended families, entertain large groups of friends in our homes, enjoy museums or the theater. We stopped kissing, hugging and even



shaking hands with anyone outside of our bubble, scrupulously keeping our distance from everyone else. We had to wear a mask wherever we went, always aware of the threat of infection. Some of us have suffered financially. Many of us have suffered a loss of family members and friends. There are quite a few among us who suffered from the virus firsthand.

We could all add more items to the list above. There are plenty of reasons to bid good riddance to 2020. The mere fact that the year will now end in a different number feels like enough of a reason to celebrate. Just seeing the calendar turn to 2021 gives us hope that, maybe, just maybe, things will start to get better soon; that we will be able to put this terrible year behind us and move on.

There are, of course, solid reasons to hope that 2021 will be a better year. Vaccinations for COVID-19 are being rolled out. Our representatives in Congress may finally be coming together to take concrete action to address some of the economic fallout from the pandemic. We have learned enough about the virus to treat it more effectively than we could during the first devastating months of the outbreak.

As Jews, though, we have learned from our long historical experience that hope is not enough to change our circumstances. Relying solely on forces outside our own control is a recipe for disappointment, if not disaster. Not surprisingly, our own New Year's celebration has made this lesson a central part of the holiday. When it comes to Rosh HaShannah and Yom Kippur, there are plenty of prayers that remind us how much of what will happen in the year ahead is in God's hands. Still, we take stock, we repent, we try to make changes in our behavior. We believe that, while God is the final arbiter, "repentance, prayer and act of generosity may avert the evil decree." We have the power, through our actions, to make next year a better year, even if God has the final say.

I believe we ought to take the same approach to this new secular year. We should be asking ourselves, "what actions can we take as individuals, as families and as a community" to avert a repeat of the "evil decree" that was 2020?

As individuals and families, the most important things we can do are simplest. Wear masks, take social distancing seriously, wash our hands. If we are feeling sick, don't try to just push through. Get tested and quarantine until the test comes back. Get vaccinated as soon as your turn comes. Aside from the vaccinations, none of these steps are new or different than what we have been asked to do for the last ten months. But each of these precautions takes on heightened importance precisely because we are so sick of having to take them. We cannot allow ourselves to give in to fatigue or indifference now, when case numbers are still rising and we may be months away from receiving the vaccine.

As a community, we should rally around those institutions and businesses that are helping us get through this difficult time. That includes our synagogue, Plainview Jewish Center. Like so many other faith communities, we have been working tirelessly to serve our members and the community at large. We have had to change the way we do so many things, from services, to Religious School, to social events, on the fly. We have had to offer support to large numbers of families and individuals who suffered losses this year or who have been ill for long periods of time. We have worked hard to reach out to our members who have needed help and support, whether it was offering help to pick up groceries or much needed aid for families who have suffered financial setbacks. We have been doing all this work while incurring unexpected new expenses and suffering a serious revenue shortfall. Some people in our community who have supported PJC for years were not able support us this year. We were unable to conduct the kind of hands-on, inperson fundraisers that normally help us to support our high level of activity.

To be frank, we are hurting. And we could really use your help to make sure that we can keep on serving our community at the high level we have maintained during these first ten months of the pandemic. While the end of this difficult period of our lives may be in sight, we still have a long way to go. We cannot afford to lose focus. Help us to continue the vital work we have been doing. If you are at all able to, support our ongoing fundraising efforts. Partner with the members of our PJC family in making sure that we start this new year strong. We are all hoping for a better New Year. But only through your generosity and support can we make that hope a reality.







The week of the event, you will receive a delivery with your team's flag. The flag is your game piece and MUST appear in each photo. About 10:30am on the day of the event, your team captain will receive an email with the specific tasks. You must take an appropriate photo WITH the flag in order to earn points for your team.

One team per car. Please register each team/car separately. You may have as many teams as you have cars and legal, safe drivers. It is recommended that all drivers must be over the age of 18 with at least one year of driving experience.

In the case that the weather is deemed unsafe, the event will be rescheduled. We do not want drivers to risk the safety of the passengers for this event. The New Year for the Trees - Tu B'Shevat

Tu B'Shevat is the Jewish New Year for trees. It occurs on the 15th day in the month of Shevat in the Jewish calendar and on the night of January 27th this year in the American calendar. The transliteration of the words Tu B'Shevat actually means the 15th of Shevat. In Judaism, the age of a tree is important in determining whether you can eat the fruit from it. The fruit from a tree cannot be eaten for the first three years, and the fourth year's fruit is only for G-d. After the four years, you can eat the fruit from a tree. Tu B'Shevat is the day that each tree ages a year for the purposes of determining if one can eat from it.

Tu B'Shevat is a minor holiday and is not mentioned in the Torah. Scholars believe that the holiday started as an agricultural festival celebrating spring in Israel. However, after the destruction of the Second Temple many Jews were exiled and the agricultural celebration stopped. Over time Jews wanted to symbolically tie themselves to their homeland and Tu B'Shevat was a way to fill the need.

Today Tu B'Shevat is celebrated as an environmental holiday. It is a time to remind ourselves of our duty to take care of nature. It is typically marked by sending money to plant trees in Israel and more recently with a Tu B'Shevat Seder. The Seder involves eating Biblical foods native to Israel and mentioned in the Torah, such as grapes, figs, dates, pomegranates and olives.

This year we are excited to participate in a revamped Jewish National Fund (JNF) program titled "These are the trees in our neighborhood." The goal is to move beyond the conversation of what trees provide from "air and paper" to the values that we get from specific trees. The program is made up of videos, questions and activities that will help students connect to environmentalism in our neighborhood and to Israeli history. For example, a video on our state tree and why it is important. And videos about trees in Israel such as the Olive Tree, which is the national tree. Another lesson will incorporate the story of Eli Cohen, the spy who convinced the Syrian government to plant eucalyptus trees in the Golan Heights so Israel could target them in the Six Day War. Students will also receive parsley seeds to plant.

Here's to 2021 - an environmentally friendly year for all.

NEW YEAR'S RESOLUTION TO CHECK YOUR CREDIT REPORT

Prevent Problems by Staying Informed

As the new year begins and you are thinking about 2021 resolutions, consider adding "check credit reports" to your list. Whether you are shopping for a car, applying to refinance a mortgage, switching auto insurance providers, or looking for a new job, the information contained in your credit report can impact the options available to you. The lowest interest rates and most favorable terms are generally reserved for those with excellent credit, and while potential employers cannot see your credit score, in circumstances when applying for a position in certain fields such as finance, sensitive data management or law enforcement, some may request permission to access your reports. With three separate credit bureaus gathering information about you, there is potential for errors or incorrect information to be included, and given that even one error can affect your credit, it's wise to monitor your reports on a regular basis.

What is in your credit report?

Experian, TransUnion and Equifax are the three credit bureaus which collect information about you that stays in your report for an average of seven to ten years. Your payment history, credit utilization ratio, age and types of accounts you have open, and the number of hard inquiries seeking more credit are tracked regularly. Additionally, public records such as bankruptcies, tax liens and judgements may also appear. A positive history and balanced mix of these factors leads to the best results from the scoring models used by the bureaus. A credit score of 700 or above generally qualifies for more favorable terms and conditions.

What should you look for when checking your reports?

The three credit bureaus gather information about you independently from each other and not all lenders or creditors report to each of the bureaus. Sometimes information is only reported to ONE agency and not ALL THREE, potentially leaving you at a disadvantage if there is incorrect or incomplete data. Let's say you are applying for a car lease, and they happen to pull the one report that shows you in the worst light. This could cost you more as your lease amount is determined. It a good idea to check all of your reports and not assume they will be the same. While each report is laid out differently, and they can be a challenge to read, closely review them looking for anything out of sorts or unfamiliar. Common errors include incorrect information about your identity, incorrect reporting of an account's status, data management errors or balance errors. It's possible to find accounts incorrectly reported as late or delinquent, closed accounts reported as open, or unfamiliar

accounts attributed to you resulting from identity theft. If you find any errors, you can file a dispute with the credit bureau that is reporting the incorrect information. Be prepared to explain in writing what is wrong and include any documentation that will support your claim.

How do you check your credit reports?

You are allowed by law to see your information annually, for free, and this type of self-inquiry will not affect your credit scores. One way you can access it is at www.AnnualCreditReport.com. Ideally, you should strive to check your information every four months, on a rotating schedule, so that you can monitor what each of the bureaus has listed. For instance, you could review your Experian report in January, your TransUnion report in May and your Equifax report in September. Additionally, there are numerous identity theft protection services that can monitor and alert you to changes in your reports and credit scores, helping you to stay aware of potential problems as they arise. Many of these services will provide assistance in resolving any issues from your identity being stolen.

We can do our best to guard our personal information online and in person, but threats lurk everywhere. From accidentally visiting a website that is not secure, falling victim to a credit card skimming machine on an ATM, or simply being in a database that has been hacked, it's easy for our information to fall into the wrong hands. Beyond that, sometimes mistakes simply happen. You can take steps to avoid unnecessary headaches and protect your credit by paying close attention to the information contained in your credit reports.



A rare exploration into the inner hearts of people willing to sacrifice everything for a glimmer

When my Italian, Jewish first cousin wrote to me last February from Venice, Italy, and told me how fast a dangerous situation had developed, I thought she was exaggerating. The COVID 19 virus hit the region of Veneto, where Venice is located, and it carries the highest infection and death rate in the country. So, they are being especially careful. She wrote "The situation in Venice is very sad. There are so many grieving families. We are awaiting a modern miracle that, hopefully, the lights of Chanukah will bring."

For months, people cannot travel between regions. It was, however, allowed for a few days in December so people could return to their homes if they were official residents—the officials knock on doors and check!! No longer are weddings allowed by decree of law for the next few months.

When my husband, Gene, and I went to Italy in 2017, my cousins put us up in one of their beautiful homes on Lido Island. They stocked the refrigerator and wine rack, bought us a beautiful Murano vase, and gave us an unfamiliar, pre-paid voucher for the vaporettos (there are no cars in Venice).

One of the most memorable parts of the trip was my cousin giving us a personal tour of Venice and the Jewish "ghetto" area. We saw the five synagogues, the Jewish museum and the holocaust memorial wall.

It was so warming for me to see my first-cousins, Laurie and Carlo, and their adult children practice Conservative Judaism. As usual, on Friday night, they stop everything and gather around their table for Shabbas, with challah, candles, kiddush cups and yarmulkes. Of course, it is followed by a scrumptious, Jewish-Italian dinner.

My cousin, Laurie, was a history teacher in Brooklyn thirty-seven years ago, when she went to Venice on her summer break. Immediately after being approached by a suspicious-looking stranger, a young, handsome man came to her rescue. After chatting, they discovered each other to be Jewish and four days later, he proposed marriage. Laurie and Carlo have been happily married for thirty-seven years and come to the States to visit every two or three years.
