After New York State lifted its mask mandate for public places and schools, our Medical Advisory Team met to discuss next steps for PJC. As a result of our discussions, PJC will be revising its policies on masking and COVID protocols beginning Friday, March 4th.

- Masks will be optional for everyone at all PJC services, events, programs and classes.
- · We will resume Torah processions and aliyot at the reading table.
- In accordance with CDC guidelines, anyone who has contracted COVID must quarantine for 5 days before re-entering PJC. After that time if that person is asymptomatic and fever free, they may return to PJC but must remain masked for an additional five days.
- We ask that anyone with any COVID-like symptoms please remain home until these symptoms resolve.
- We will continue to monitor conditions in our community. If COVID rates rise significantly, which we hope they will not, we may return to more restrictive policies.
- We ask that everyone support each other in whatever decisions each person makes regarding the level of COVID precautions they feel are necessary for themselves.

We understand that these changes are a significant departure from the protocols we have become used to after the last two years. It may take some time for each person to find their comfort level. Please be patient with each other.

We want to thank our Medical Advisory Team for their dedication and hard work during the past two years. The Medical Advisory Team will continue to meet as needed. However, we hope that this announcement will lead to a return to a more "normal" way of doing things at PJC that will continue from hereon out.

FROM THE RABBI by Rabbi Steven Conn

I shared a version of this column as a d'var Torah shortly before Purim. Never did I imagine it would still be so relevant many weeks later.

What do the names of the following places bring to mind: Odessa, Kiev, Lviv, Karhkiev? For anyone who is following



current events this days, this is an easy question: these are among the cities in Ukraine being bombarded by Russian forces. But for students of Jewish history, this list of cities, to which many others could be added, carries a darker significance. Each of these cities was the scene of a pogrom, a massacre of Jews by the native Ukranians.

Violence against Jews has a long history in Ukraine. The first anti-Jewish attacks may have occurred as early as the twelfth century. In the seventeenth century, Ukraine was the scene of the Chelmnicki pogroms, in which Ukrainian Cassocks massacred tens of thousands of Jews. There were 660 pogroms in Ukraine between 1903 and 1906, the worst of which, in fact, occurred in the city of Odessa.

In spite of world wide outrage, the pogroms resumed after the Russian revolution. 20,000 Jews were killed in Kiev in 1919. During World War II, Ukranian Nationalists perpetrated a pogrom in Liviv, killing 6,000 Jews. Ukranians also joined Nazi *einsatgruppen* killing squads to round up and murder Jews in many other Ukranian cities.

Throughout its long history, Ukrainians have committed countless acts of violence against the Jewish population. While there have been many periods of history when Jews lived securely in Ukraine, it is hard to think of Ukraine without remembering all these terrible atrocities.

How, then, are we supposed to react when we see the brutal destruction of Ukraine at the hands of the Russian military? Surely, we do not get any satisfaction from seeing the horrors of war visited upon Ukrainians. But how sympathetic can we be to the descendants of people who committed terrible crimes against our fellow Jews only eighty years ago?

At first glance, our maftir reading today might seem to suggest that we have the right, and even the duty, to avenge ourselves on a people who committed such (continued on page 6)

heinous acts. Or at the very least, that we might see their destruction at the hands of another people as the comeuppance they deserve.

In our maftir reading, we are commanded to:

"Remember what Amalek did to you on your journey, after you left Egypt—how, undeterred by fear of God, he surprised you on the march, when you were famished and weary, and cut down all the stragglers in your rear. Therefore, when your God Adonai grants you safety from all your enemies around you, in the land that your God Adonai is giving you as a hereditary portion, you shall blot out the memory of Amalek from under heaven. Do not forget!

The Amalekites were a marauding people who attacked the Israelites at their most vulnerable point as they were journeying toward Mount Sinai after the Exodus. Moses sends Joshua to lead the Israelites' defense. Eventually, the Amalekites are turned back; but they are never fully defeated.

This is certainly not the first time another nation targeted the Israelites nor was it the most severe. The Egyptians killed more Israelites over a much longer period of time. The Philistines inflicted many losses in the time of Saul and David. The Assyrians decimated ten of the twelve tribes. Why is it, then, that the Torah singles out the Amalekites for attention? Why is it so important that we remember the Amalekites and dedicate ourselves to blotting them out of existence?

In today's haftarah, we can see that, at least in Biblical times, the Israelites took the Torah's instructions as literal commandS. God sent Saul on a mission to wipe out all the Amalekites. But as time went on, our tradition began to see these instructions differently.

As Rabbi Joseph Soleveitchik points out, there are actually two aspects to the Torah's commandment. One aspect, to be sure, is the very specific duty to wipe out the Amalekites. But the other, more important aspect is a communal obligation to defend the Jewish people against any enemy threatening its destruction. In our time, only the second part of this mitzvah is relevant.

For more than 2500 years, the remnants of Amalek have been mixed up with other nations. As early as Talmudic times, the rabbis recognized that there is no longer an identifiable people called Amalek. Therefore, the idea of revenge is no longer relevant. The important obligation that remains is for us to come together

as a people to fight against acts of antisemitic violence, no matter who the perpetrators are.

Soleveitchik and the rabbis of the Talmud could have gone another way with the commandment to remember Amalek. They could have identified anyone who attacks the Jews with Amalek and given us blanket permission to seek revenge.

But they don't. Instead, they legislate revenge out of existence.

This is not to say that Jewish law does not command us to seek justice. That is what the Eichmann trial, for example, was all about. But God does not want us to seek revenge, not on those who commit violence against us, and certainly not on their descendants, who had nothing to do with the atrocities.

We are not to forget the past, but we are not to dwell on it either. We may never harbor warm feelings toward Ukraine. Yet it is important to note that it is the home of between 50 and 250,000 Jews, depending on whose number we use—the third largest Jewish community in Europe. Ukraine, as we all know, also has a Jewish head of state. And most important, the Ukranians are God's creatures, and they are suffering and dying because of an act of unprovoked aggression.

Rather than focus on thoughts of revenge on this Shabbat Zachor, however understandable they may be, we would do better to remember two different passages from the Torah that speak much more profoundly to our current situation.

"Do not stand idly by the blood of your fellow." and "Love your fellow as yourself."

May God hear our prayers and deliver the Ukranian people from those who, undettered by fear of God, seek to destroy them.

May God bring an end to bloodshed in war, in Ukraine and throughout the world. May God help us to bring a true and lasting peace to our world, may the time come when nations will cease to make war upon other nations and humankind will finally live in true harmony with God.

Postscript: In the spirit of "Do not stand idly by" and "Love your neighbor" PJC collected supplies and donations for Ukraine Relief in collaboration with the Holy Family Ukranian Catholic Church in Lindenhurst. We brought several truckloads of supplies and donated over \$3300. Thanks to Stu Haimes for making the connection and coordinating and thanks to all our volunteers.

Freddy, and his staff, for the preparations and the serving of the delicious food, and Robert Ian Caterers for preparation of the Seder meal. The Seders were very well attended. We had approximately 20 people on the first evening and 50 for the second evening. The Passover spirit was felt throughout the room with Cantor Merrick's lively guitar accompaniment.

Back at the end of March, PJC advertised and reached out to our members and community sponsoring a Ukrainian Relief Goods Drive. I want to thank Stuart Haimes for organizing this event. Not only did we get donations of goods, we also obtained monetary funds from fellow congregants and those outside of our congregation. A special thank you to all of those whom contributed to the cause. I just want to let everyone also know that on the weekend of April 10th, both Stu Haimes and Shea Lerner, in my absence, presented the Holy Family Ukrainian Catholic Church in Lindenhurst with a check in the amount of \$3,500.

Our grant committee has just received notice that PJC was awarded a \$50,000 NYS Hate Crimes Grant. A big Yasher Koach to the committee consisting of the chair – Linda Klayman, Rabbi Conn, Alan Miller, Eugene Brickman, Norman Kaufman and myself. The grant funds will be used to install a public address system and a day alarm/intrusion duress system. To date this committee has been awarded a total of \$400,000 to upgrade the security and provide a safe environment for all of our members and families. As you can see the front entrance has been replaced with a more modern doorway, which not only provides a sense of being in a secured building, but it also enhanced the front entrance and modernized it a bit.

This coming month as our religious school year comes to an end, I am looking forward to wishing a Mazel Tov to all of our graduates and families. Let us not forget we still have activities available for to you and your friends to participate in at PJC. Whether it be our USY program or the programs the Rabbi has initiated, they





The security training seminar originally scheduled for April 6th has been postponed to May 4th.

The security grant committee has been working very diligently on being awarded grant money from the DHES Homeland Security for the past couple of years. The new front entrance doors have finally been installed and the blast mitigation film has been installed on all the lower level windows of PJC. The cameras and surveillance system equipment is on order and will be installed in the coming weeks. For the first grant to be complete we are offering a security training seminar.

The training is required to be attended by all paid staff of PJC. In addition, we encourage our lay leaders in services, board members, and regular attendees plus anyone that is frequently in the building for meetings to attend one of the training sessions below. The training will provide us with what will need to be done in the event we are faced with an unsafe situation in the sanctuary, religious school or anywhere in the building.

This training, which will be presented by the Regional Security Manager from JCRC, will be offered at the times shown below in the sanctuary. The individual presenting the training has numerous years in the security industry working security in Israel and for EL AL.

The training should last no more than one hour.
